To help pledge submitter's measure their progress, outcomes and impacts of implementation, REN21 will employ monitoring tools including a reporting system as well as the development of indicators.

History of the International Action Programme (IAP)



The DIAP is a continuation of the International Action Programme initiated at the first international renewable energy conference in Bonn in 2004. The Bonn conference

aimed to advance multi-stakeholder co-operation on renewable energy for rapid, flexible bottom-up action as a complement to UN frameworks.

This new multi-stakeholder approach translated into the International Action Programme: a collection of specific, measurable commitments made by public and private actors who have voluntarily pledged to implement actions for renewable energy advancement.

The IAP has proven to be a powerful way to stimulate and replicate action on renewables, allowing dedicated stakeholders to showcase their leadership and advance implementation.

REN21 has developed and coordinated the International Action Programme since its inception from Bonn 2004 to Beijing 2005, Washington 2008 and in preparation for DIREC 2010. DIREC 2010 is a new opportunity for governments and other major stakeholders to make bold pledges to develop and enact policies and actions that will tackle energy security, environment and economic challenges through renewable energy.
